

Consultation on Private Health Reform Options

In January 2025, Cancer Council Australia completed a submission to the Department of Health and Aged Care on Private Health Reform Options. This consultation aimed to understand stakeholder and community feedback about a selection of short-term private health reform options.

Cancer Council's submission covered the following areas:

- Ensuring that people affected by cancer are not disadvantaged by any of the proposed options, with any reform maintaining a goal of reducing the out-of-pocket costs associated with cancer for all Australians. To this point, we recommended that out-of-pocket cost evaluations be a key component of all reform evaluation.
- We discouraged a self-regulatory approach to ensure that Australians received better outcomes, without undue industry influence or interference, reinforcing that safeguarding patients from burdensome administrative procedures as a result of healthcare reforms should be a priority of the Government.
- We advocated for Hospital in the Home programs, with cancer as a priority condition. It is safe and effective to deliver cancer treatments such as chemotherapy and immunotherapy in the home for some patient cohorts using a domiciliary workforce.
- Public and private sectors and insurers must work together to deliver and finance a
 comprehensive range of mental health services for people affected by cancer. The proposed
 reform to the 10-year moratorium for psychiatrists will need to be regularly reviewed to
 ensure the long-term success and that it is achieving the envisaged workforce distribution
 goals.
