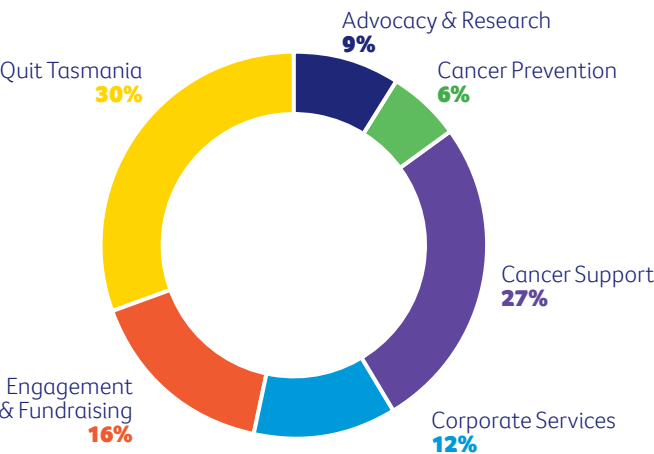

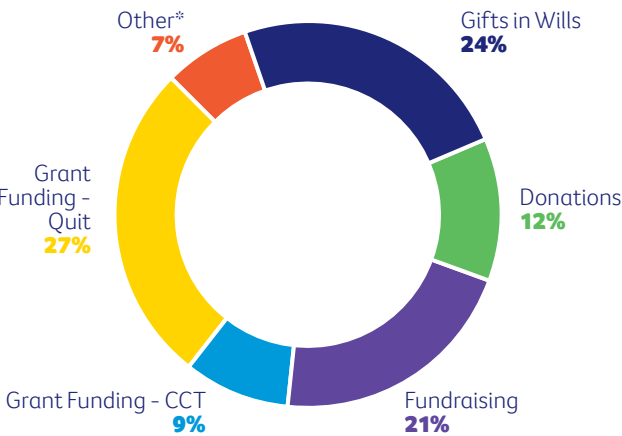

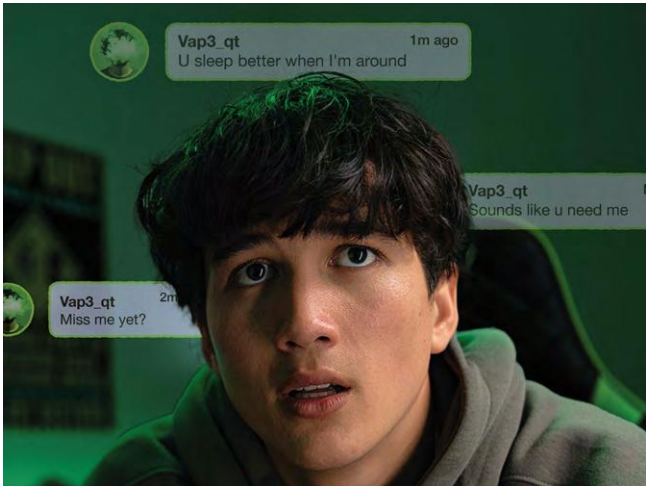

Providing supportive care services to our community

Our goal is to ensure supportive care is available for all Tasmanians impacted by all cancers. This includes practical, emotional, physical and informational support tailored to individual needs from diagnosis through to treatment, survivorship or palliative care. Our Supportive Care team provide a range of services including one on one emotional support, support groups and activities, practical supports such as transport to treatment, financial or wig services, complementary therapies, plus access to a range of information, resources and assistance navigating other cancer services.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

A total of **464** financial support applications (scholarships, financial assistance and vouchers) were approved with each payment ranging from \$250 - \$2,000 (less for vouchers). These went to:

- **339** adults diagnosed with cancer
- **106** children (either diagnosed with cancer or impacted by a family member diagnosis)
- **19** educational scholarships to young people impacted by cancer.

A total of **\$176,349** in financial assistance (including scholarships) was paid and distributed plus \$2,210 in vouchers (petrol and food).

Driving better outcomes through transport2treatment

Our transport2treatment service (t2t) continues to provide no-cost transport to Tasmanians facing barriers getting to and from their cancer treatment appointments. We offer a safe and supportive environment for clients that is only possible through the huge contribution of our team of **67** volunteer drivers.

Not only does the transport2treatment service offer practical support in getting to and from treatment every day, but also encourages social support and camaraderie between patients sharing rides. For many, it can be a valuable opportunity to socialise in a non-clinical setting, and find some social support with those experiencing similar hardships.

transport2treatment operates outside of public transport and taxi routes, making it invaluable to those in rural and regional areas like Huonville, Shearwater, Triabunna and the Central Highlands.

transport2treatment supports a broad cross-section of our community, with clients aged from **4** to **100** years old and from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Our total return trips reached **6,709**
- We transported our clients to and from **174** different Tasmanian suburbs and towns
- Our volunteer drivers logged over **333,000** kilometres of driving
- We supported **537** individuals, of which **387** were new clients to the service.

Cancer prevention

We're working in partnership with our community to help Tasmanians reduce their cancer risk with a focus on:

- Being **SunSmart** – reducing the risk of skin cancer by promoting sun protection through information and resources, public awareness campaigns and delivering the SunSmart program with Tasmanian schools and workplaces
- Encouraging **early detection** – through community education around cancer symptom awareness & promoting national cancer screening programs to find cancer early
- **Advocating** – for healthy environments that support healthy eating and physical activity and reduce exposure to harmful substances such as alcohol, tobacco and vaping
- Creating **safer workplaces** – by helping Tasmanian organisations understand the occupational cancer risks that may exist in their workplaces, and how to reduce them.

IMPACT AT A GLANCE

- **68 community presentations** delivered in communities that may be at a higher risk of a cancer diagnosis or experience barriers to early detection
- **20 self-guided learning modules** providing a flexible learning option to organisations and workplaces
- **6,541 resources distributed statewide** providing evidence based cancer prevention information for all Tasmanians.

SPOTLIGHT: SUNSMART SCHOOLS AND EARLY CHILDHOOD PROGRAM

For more than **25 years** we have been protecting young Tasmanians through our SunSmart program.

In 2025 there were 413 SunSmart member primary and secondary schools and early childhood services, protecting **69,000+** children through evidence-based SunSmart policies and initiatives.

Advocacy

Cancer Council Tasmania continues to be committed to pursuing systemic change to reduce the incidence of cancer, increase survival rates, and improve the wellbeing of Tasmanians.

We achieve this by actively monitoring current trends and issues impacting the delivery of cancer services and programs in Tasmania and advocating for public investment into evidence-based cancer prevention measures and cancer support services. It also remains a priority to provide leadership for the delivery of improved services and programs across the Tasmanian cancer sector and to collaborate with our Tasmanian health sector partners to drive positive change in the overall health of Tasmanians.

Over the past 12 months, our work has included:

- A formal submission to the development of a Tasmanian Cancer Plan
- Commissioning and releasing a 10-year forecast of Tasmanian cancer diagnoses
- A formal submission to the development of the Tasmanian 20-Year Preventive Health Strategy
- Advocacy for increased Tasmanian Government investment into Cancer Council Tasmania's cancer supportive care and cancer prevention programs and services.
- Raising awareness of the Tasmanian results of the Australian Bureau of Statistics survey into sun protective behaviours, funded by the Cancer Councils of Australia that found that Tasmanians were more likely to report burning after 30 minutes of sun exposure compared to all Australians (and more likely to report spending more than 15 minutes outdoors during peak UV times.)
- Successful advocacy for the passing of the Public Health Amendment (Vaping) Bill 2024, ensuring e-cigarettes, e-liquid and vaping devices can now only be legally accessed by adults over 18 years of age, and only through a pharmacy with a doctor's prescription.
- Advocacy to reverse the Tasmanian government's 50% funding cut to Tasmania's proven anti-tobacco campaigns and extend funding for the successful 'Don't Let It In' youth anti-vaping campaign.

Investing in research

Cancer Council Tasmania continues to be one of the largest funders of locally focused cancer research. This effort is supported by the generosity of the Tasmanian community through donations, fundraising and research specific bequests. Research is core to our mission and funds continue to be allocated based on expert peer review through our Scientific and Research Committee. In 2024-25 Cancer Council Tasmania invested into several cancer research projects, including:

- **\$90,000** towards data management clinical trials at Royal Hobart Hospital and Launceston General Hospital.
- **\$40,000** awarded to Dr Lauren Akesson for the project *'Genetics Adviser: A Digital Health Intervention to Increase Genetic Testing.'*
- **\$40,000** invested into two projects commissioned by Cancer Council Tasmania. The first, an evaluation of the broader patient benefits of the transport2treatment service by Dr Emily Hansen and Dr Susan Banks (UTAS). The second, a 10-year forecast of Tasmanian cancer diagnoses from the Tasmanian Cancer Registry.
- **\$20,000** awarded to Dr. Liesel Fitzgerald for the project *'Developing prostate organoids from induced pluripotent stem cells (iPSCs) – a pilot study.'* This funding was made possible through the generous support of Tuxedo Junction, a black-tie charity ball fundraiser, raising funds for cancer research for almost 20 years.
- Over **\$130,000** through the Cancer Council Tasmania Evelyn Pedersen Fund – a bequest provided by the late, Evelyn Pedersen. These funds are made available to local cancer researchers through a long-standing partnership between Cancer Council Tasmania and UTAS. Support has been provided to:
 - Jasmine Bacon (UTAS). PhD scholarship for the project *'Understanding the Financial and Employment Experiences and Needs of People with Prostate Cancer and their Carers.'*
 - Sophie Navickas (UTAS). PhD scholarship for the project *'BRG1-dependent evolution of the epigenome in medulloblastoma.'*
 - Dr Kelsie Raspin. Current Cancer Council Tasmania Fellow, to support a 12-month extension of their Fellowship.

This year we were so privileged to have 3 amazing Matts complete mighty personal challenges as fundraisers.

While the rest of Launceston's Relayers were getting ample sleep the eve of the 2025 event, 40-year-old Launceston man, Matt Dingjan, was at the start of his run for 24 hours straight in honour and memory of his mother Debbie who died from cancer in 2021. After finding purpose and strength in running, Matt and his Relay team, 'Debbie's Tides of Hope' raised more than **\$70,000** for Cancer Council Tasmania, in a nod to the support Debbie and her family received during her illness. Matt's indefatigable efforts saw him placed as the number one individual Relay fundraiser Nationally and Debbie's Tides of Hope placed as second team currently.

In October 2024, across 6 days and 233 kilometres, 'Matt's Walk' saw 52-year-old Queenstown local, Matt Feldman, trek from Queenstown to Devonport, dedicating his challenge to family members impacted by cancer. Matt's Walk was supported by members of Penguin Relay For Life team 'Mission Family' in a myriad of ways. Matt and 'Mission Family's' incredible feat was recognised with the team being placed in the National Top 10 Relay fundraisers and Matt in the top 5 individuals, with a total of nearly **\$25,000** raised.

At the start of May 2025, Matt took on an incredible challenge – running 500km from Cockle Creek to Stanley in just 12 days! What inspired this mission was personal. Matt was diagnosed with Stage 3 Bowel Cancer in April 2024 at quite a young age. He underwent surgery and 12 rounds of chemotherapy and is now in the surveillance stage. Matt ran the equivalent of 12 marathons in 12 days, representing the 12 rounds of chemotherapy he went through. He raised over **\$125,000** for Cancer Council Tasmania and is using his experience to advocate for early detection.

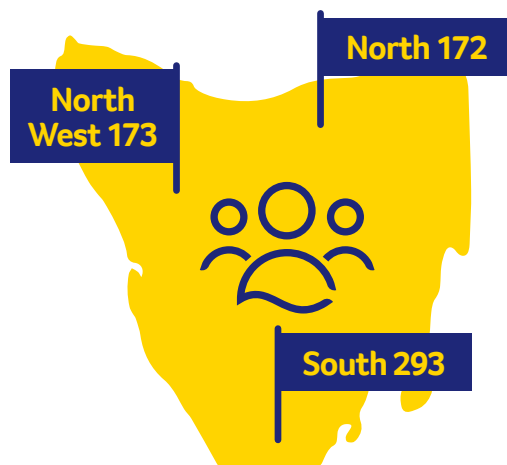
Celebrating the heart of our organisation: Our Volunteers

Volunteers remain the heart of Cancer Council Tasmania, making up around 90% of our workforce and contributing across every aspect of our organisation. Their dedication, compassion and generosity enable us to deliver vital services and support to Tasmanians impacted by cancer.

With over 600 volunteers statewide, their roles are diverse and essential – from driving patients to treatment through our transport2treatment program (over 6,700 trips annually), to creating welcoming spaces in our Cancer Support Centres and Clothes4Cancer Opp Shop, leading walking groups or helping facilitate support groups.

Our volunteers also serve on our Board, sub-committees and advisory groups, offering valuable expertise and leadership. Many help and run fundraising events, with entire committees led by volunteers and many more assisting on the day.
